Looking back to the 2024/25 Methodist Church year, a personal highlight was my three month period of sabbatical leave. (Sabbaticals are granted to Methodist Church ministers every seven years – based on the 'sabbath' principle of the seven day cycle of work and rest which is reflected in the account of creation in the opening chapters of Genesis, the first book of the Bible).

I want to say THANK YOU for the gift of that sabbatical leave, for the purposes of reflection, renewal and refreshment. It is good to be back among you in the Stamford Methodist Circuit, and I hope that the evidence of my sabbatical – not least the renewal and refreshment – is obvious and will bear fruit as we continue to engage in God's mission together.

THANK YOU especially to those who carried extra burdens and responsibilities during my period of sabbatical leave, whether that was in the local churches or across the circuit. Your hard work and commitment, not always visible to other people, are appreciated greatly by me and others.

Some of you will be aware that not all of my sabbatical proposals worked out as I hoped they would. For obvious reasons, my planned leading of a pilgrimage group to the Holy Land did not happen. This made me acutely aware that, whilst I was resting and experiencing refreshment, the people of Gaza were facing unimaginable suffering. (At the time of writing, there are no signs of this situation changing anytime soon. Despite this, we must continue to pray and work in whatever ways possible for resolution of the conflict in Israel and the Palestinian Territories – and also in other areas of the world). During my sabbatical I have begun sharing in the Wednesday evening (6pm UK time) Zoom times of reflection and prayer organised by the Methodist Church's liaison office in Jerusalem. (More information, including the Zoom link, available by email - office@mlojerusalem.org).

My proposed trip to the Nixon Memorial Hospital in Sierra Leone proved logistically difficult to organise. I've learned quite a bit about liaison and communication with World Church partners during my sabbatical. As a result of meeting the Presiding Bishop of the Methodist Church in Sierra Leone during his time at this year's Methodist Conference, my visit to Sierra Leone is being rescheduled for spring 2026.

One challenge which I faced on my sabbatical was where to worship on Sundays. Some weeks I attended worship at the church where my Mum worships (and where I grew up in the Sunday School and received my call to preach and to ordained ministry). On a few other Sundays I shared in worship at the churches in Leicester where Karl plays the organ. However, I also worshipped in a few other churches. On each occasion I found myself noticing the things which are done similarly or differently to in the churches which I serve as minister. It is possible to learn from and be challenged by experiences of church and worship beyond what is familiar to us. (Maybe you've had similar experiences when worshipping in other churches, e.g. whilst on holiday).

A thread running through what I've already written is the sense of being part of the Church which is much bigger and diverse than our local churches in the Stamford Circuit. This is something to rejoice about as we move into a new Methodist Church year. May we know God's blessings as we do so!

CHANGES AT EMPINGHAM

As many of you will know Empingham Methodist Church hosted the Community Post Office since 2003. For almost 22 years Adele, our postmistress served us well, always going the extra mile, and becoming a very good friend to us all. In June 2025 Adele retired, and the Post Office facilities in Empingham changed.

The village is now served by a weekly Mobile Post Office parked at the safest place in the village, the village pub car park from 2.15pm t 3.45pm every Tuesday afternoon.

Over the many years our church on a Monday afternoon had become an excellent social hub, with tea and cake, second-hand books and good friendship serving the village community well. To continue this good fellowship a couple from our church, Clare & Logan run a Lunch Club once a month. This is held on the first Monday of the month, at 1pm,. The other Mondays we meet at 2 – till 4pm with Tea & Cake, second-hand books, board games and friendship.

The new arrangements have proved very successful. Please pray for this new outreach facility.

'STOP THE BOAT' PROTESTS

Request for Prayer

News came out at the beginning of September, with extremely short notice, that a group of people in Peterborough were planning a demonstration outside of the Dragonfly Hotel. This is a hotel which is housing asylum seekers. The aim of the demonstration was to scare them out of the hotel.

Charlotte Davis, our circuit safeguarding officer and member at Ryhall, began to organise a counter-protest and I joined them on the evening of 29th August outside the hotel.

One of my reasons for going was the passage I was preaching from on the following Sunday:

"Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering." Hebrews 13:1-3.

As we stood, in front of the hotel, with the police between the two groups, and I witnessed what was happening, my heart broke, because I could see the pain and fear in the protestors and in those in the hotel. As statements were shouted and threats made against me, those standing beside me and the people in the hotel and, as I overheard a few women talking to the police about their fears and frustrations, I could hear what the three groups had in common. I could see us all, brothers and sisters, and I imagined what it could be like if we could only lower our defences and find a way to move forward together.

- We all want the hotels to close.
- We all want the small boats to stop.
- We all want people to be able to live safely and in peace.
- But we are all looking in different directions and focussing our efforts in different ways on how to resolve the situation. We are divided and therefore weaker.

This is a massive issue which is tied up in the political, economic and social situation of our country, as well as what is happening around the world. None of us have any easy answers, but I do know that some of us around the Circuit are being called to respond in different ways.

Regardless of where you stand on this issue I am asking the following:

- 1. Please would you pray on every Friday evening from 5pm (or at some point over the evening) for **all of us** at the Dragonfly Hotel. Maybe praying for peace, for conversation, for fear to be overcome and for opportunities for this to move forwards in God's will.
- 2. If you would like to join the counter protest please contact either Charlotte or myself and we will link you in to the group. VE DAY CELEBRATIONS 2025

I was recently invited to talk with the children at St Augustine's School as part of their 'listening ear' library. The children were able to circulate and talk to myself and three others about **Victory in Europe.** I explained to them at as a Pacifist I could not celebrate victory in a battle but could celebrate the end of the war, and they understood this. I was too young, and living in Darlington, to see the effects of the war although we did have to be rationed for food. I told them of the estimated number of deaths caused by world war2. An estimated death toll of between 70 to 85 million people, which is mote that the current population of this country, 68.35 million. I reached 18 yrs at the time of conscription and was invited by the Queen to join the armed forces. It was my right, by law, to register as a Conscientious Objector, after an interview, Tribunal, 5 'wise men' decided I had a conscience. I worked in a hospital instead, caring for people not learning how to kill them. I explained to the children that my decision arose from my faith. If I believed in a God of love, how could I kill? If I believed in the teachings of Jesus (who is my neighbour) how could I kill? The children recognise who was their neighbour.

Jesus lived in an occupied country

......Love thy neighbour as thyself & pray for those who persecute you.
.....blessed are the meek for they will inherit the earth
.....blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called the sons of God

I have never understood, and still don't, how Christians will obey the call of the state ahead of their faith.

Please also speak to family members or write down what your wishes would be for your funeral so that your loved ones have some guidance of what to do when the time comes.

Finally, it may help your family and the church to have contact details for one another, so that we can join together early on.

If you are the last in your family line then it is also alright for you to let your minister or your pastoral visitor know of any plans you might want.

PEACE WALK for GAZA

A silent walk in solidarity with the people of Palestine, and in particular Gaza. STAMFORD - SATURDAY 13TH SEPTEMBER

The people of Palestine have been silenced for over 75 years; their lands stolen, their culture eroded, their babies killed. This is Genocide. The Peace Walk will be silent to remember the people of Gaza that have been killed and those that remain.

9.30am A gazebo will be set up in St Michael's Churchyard, where walkers can collect an A3 poster with different messages, to hold on the walk, or a card 'GAZA' to identify supporters. On the tables there will be leaflets & cards to distribute, our MP's message & posters advertising our four chosen charities, for which donations will be collected. We do not have any affiliation to these in any way, if you have any concerns please feel free to talk.

10-00 am the walk starts and continues until 4pm. To be joined, or re-joined, at any time.

A3 posters can be changed for each walk. The walk will proceed from the gazebo along that side of the street to the Rohan shop, then cross to the other side of High Street, back to Ironmongers Street; up the left hand side to the top returning on the other side, turn left into High Street, up to Marks and Spencers crossroads and back to the gazebo. Repeat as often as you are able, and if need be have a break then start again.

We ask walkers to be silent on route. Anyone willing to stop and talk to interested members of the public & provide them with information or signpost them to the Gazebo, is more than welcome.


As we compiled this document we could see all that God has done for us and with us and we celebrated the journey we have been on, as well as looking forward to the next year.

I am pleased to be able to present the Annual Report and financial statements for the Stamford Methodist Circuit for the year ending 31st August 2024.

It is my strongly held belief that the churches of our circuit remain firm in faith and resolute in their determination to offer the Gospel message to the people of Rutland and South Lincolnshire.

Achievements and Performance 2023-2024

Development of Circuit Vision

In the year 2022-2023 the Circuit Meeting had started to reflect on our circuit vision. This was driven by the need to respond to our financial situation. However, we were determined to ensure that the decisions we made were grounded in us fulfilling our mission in our communities. This work continued into 2023-2024 and structural changes were implemented to achieve that vision.

As a circuit, we were and we continue to be mindful of:

- Being responsible for our churches as well as being accountable to the District and, in turn, the Connexion;
- Being sure of who it is we serve, both in terms of God and the churches and congregations we have locally;
- Assessing what we have and what we need by way of resources and where our strengths and weaknesses are;
- Acknowledging that we are part of a bigger picture in the Kingdom of God; and
- How we honour the fact that our churches are part of both our circuit family, and their local communities, each seeking to be a unique and beautiful expression of a faith-filled Christian presence where they are.

The Circuit Meeting of 21st June 2023 unanimously agreed that we should hold the vision of growth in all areas of our work, including, but not limited to, the size of our congregations, the number of members in our churches, the discipleship of those connecting with our churches, the support we offer to our communities and financial growth for both churches and the circuit.

In our Circuit Meetings and Circuit Leadership Team Meetings throughout 2023-2024 we named the practical implications of fulfilling that vision, realising that in order to grow we needed to first make cuts, which would give the space for growth to begin.

At the same time we wanted to celebrate the churches, their gifts and what they give to their local communities. On 21st June 2024 the Circuit Leadership Team met with a member of the Northampton District Mission Team, under the theme 'Soil, Seeds and Seasons,' to reflect on the identities of each of the circuit churches and how to support each church in meeting its full potential. This theme was brought back to the Circuit Meeting and has guided us in our work for next year.

Circuit Vision remains the starting point for how we work as a circuit.

2. Prayer and Worship

- We continue to support our Preachers, Worship Leaders and those in training through quarterly meetings and provision of resources.
- We took part in Bible Month for 2024 and provided a training day for all local preachers to assist in their preparation.
- Filling the circuit plan continues to be a challenge due to the number of Local Preachers and Supernumerary ministers who are no longer able to take appointments. During this year we instigated Local Worship, services led by the churches. This has led to an increase in the use of resources provided by the Methodist Church (e.g. Methodist Homes Association, All We Can). It has also led to an increase in different types of worship including Café Church, Fellowship Services, Favourite Hymns and Readings.
- We continued to offer daily online evening prayers and online Sunday Worship reaching those who are housebound as well as others around the country and across the world.
- We committed to hold one circuit service at the beginning of each quarter.
- We held our annual circuit service at Normanton Farm.
- Individual churches hold acts of worship supporting the needs of their community, examples include Messy Church, a Dementia Church, outdoor services, remembering services, Ash Wednesday and Holy Week services and community carol services.

The Circuit Leadership Team did commit to spending time in prayer and reflection at their monthly meetings as well as time on the governance requirements for the circuit. This has not yet been fully implemented and will be a focus for the next year.

3. Discernment and Calling

- We seek to be a circuit which provides additional support for churches and individuals as they consider their calling. We are aware that this is something we need to develop further but during the reporting year the following took place:
- A speaker attended the Local Preachers and Worship Leaders meeting to talk about changes in the training programme for worship leaders and local preachers.
- 2 members of the circuit were elected by the District Synod to be representatives at the Methodist Conference.
- A circuit service was held on 3rd December to celebrate our local preachers, and several certificates were given in recognition of long service in the role.
- Our Circuit Safeguarding Officer is working with the circuit and the church safeguarding officers to create role descriptions for every role in the church. This will aid people in making informed decisions when exploring their calling.

4. Service and caring

We celebrate the various ways in which our churches serve their communities through:

- Pastoral visiting
- Support for Ukrainian refugees including offering meeting places, providing homes and assistance with paperwork and forms
- Providing a location for a village post office
- Coffee Mornings
- Providing lunches
- Supporting foodbanks
- Toddler groups
- Work amongst young people
- Fellowship Groups
- Supporting the work of uniformed organisations
- Supporting an Alcoholics Anonymous group
- Generosity in hiring buildings out
- 'Open the book' programmes in schools
- Partnerships with other organisations e.g. Second Helpings in Stamford
- Choirs
- Warm Spaces
- And many others.

The Circuit has actively supported an asylum seeker who is a member of one of our churches. Members have attended the Immigration Reporting Centre, conducted a letter writing campaign, raised money for legal fees, provided opportunities for the individual to tell their story and held an all-night prayer vigil.

The Circuit Meeting chose Water Aid as the circuit charity for the reporting year.

5. Communication

- We currently:
- Have weekly staff meetings
- Have regular meetings with church treasurers and safeguarding officers.
- Have a website which is regularly updated
- Have an active social media presence
- Assign a circuit steward to each church council
- Circulate notices / information via senior church stewards

We aim to:

- Continue to improve our communication with churches
- Provide resources for Worship where we can
- Meet regularly with property stewards
- Dedicate some Circuit Leadership Team Meetings to focus on individual churches, giving those churches an opportunity to send questions and requests for prayer or help to the meeting.
- Support local churches in their mission and ministry

6. Resources

Staffing

Exploring our Circuit Vision throughout the year, the Circuit Meeting took the decision that cuts had to be made before new growth could begin. explored this under the title "What makes a Healthy Circuit?" As well as discussing this in Circuit Meetings, we held an open meeting for anyone from any of the churches to attend and to be part of the discussions.

It was recognised that all of the circuit churches were valuable centres of mission each with their own strengths which clearly benefitted their communities. Where we could make changes was in staffing.

- Rev'd Ruth Charlesworth curtailed her appointment to the circuit; leaving in August 2024.
- Rev'd Bekkie Wright was due to enter the stationing process in September 2024 thereby leaving the circuit in August 2025. During the reporting year, Bekkie expressed a desire to extend her appointment, and this was explored by the Circuit Invitation Committee. The decision was that Bekkie's appointment would be extended by 3 years.

- A supernumerary minister who was supporting the work of the circuit re-entered
- the stationing process during the year and left the circuit in August 2024.
- A student minister in the circuit also left in August 2024 to take up a probationer
- appointment in another circuit.
- We agreed that two Lay Worker roles would be created one for Pastoral and Discipleship and another for Discipleship and Evangelism. These would replace the existing Lay Worker roles from September 2024. During the reporting year the role descriptions were agreed along with how the new staffing team would work.

Office Holding Roles

- A new Circuit Meeting Secretary was appointed after a vacancy of some time.
- The funded position for our Online and Social Media Support also came to an end, but the role- holder offered to continue the work on a voluntary basis.

7. Legal / Church Requirements

Safeguarding

- A number of Creating Safer Space Foundation module training courses have been held around the Circuit. Rev'd Andrew Hollins and the Circuit Safeguarding Officer have trained to lead the course.
- Our Circuit Safeguarding Officer has been instrumental in ensuring access for those who require the CSS Advanced module training. This included offering our circuit as a location for the training.
- Safeguarding audits were undertaken in all 9 circuit churches and for the circuit itself. The circuit audit has been reviewed on 3 occasions during the year.
- We use the safeguarding procedures well across the circuit, and ask for advice from the District Safeguarding Officer when needed.
- We review the Circuit Safeguarding Policy annually
- We maintain a database of all safeguarding requirements
- The Circuit Safeguarding Officer meets with the church safeguarding officers several times a year.

EDI

- During the year we were one of the circuits chosen to be on the Discrimination and Abuse Response Scheme (DARS) pilot.
- Rev'd Andrew Hollins and Rev'd Bekkie Wright led three EDI training courses around the circuit.
- Rev'd Bekkie Wright is a representative on the District EDI Committee and the Connexional JDS Committee.

GDPR

We continue to help churches with GDPR. A training session was held on 6^{th} March 2024. Rev'd Bekkie Wright also met with individual churches to help them complete their returns.

In the next year we intend to develop our work in this area, ensuring there is a Data Champion in each Church and that the Data-Mapping is completed for the churches and the circuit.

Property

With the change in staffing due to take effect in September 2024 the Circuit Meeting made decisions on the best locations for the ministers to live and how to ensure that the manses gave the best financial returns for the circuit. The legal and practical work was undertaken to prepare one manse for letting.

Finances

- During the year we worked with TMCP to identify the uses for restricted funds.
 The Circuit Meeting agreed to apply to derestrict some of the funds, with the commitment to use them carefully and well.
- We have kept a watchful eye on balances and sought to transfer funds from reserves as and when needed using the correct mandates.
- We held two meetings with church treasurers which have been very well received.
- We have increased our circuit lay staff salaries in line with the connexional agreed increase for ministerial stipends.

Our financial statements accounts and reserves policy are attached on pages 17 to 21 of this report.

We are aware that we have been running at a significant deficit for a number of years, but over the past few years have focussed on decreasing that deficit with the aim of having a break even balance on 1st September 2026. The changes we have made over the reported year have set us in good stead to meet that aim.
